### Presbyterians Responding to Other Presbyterians

Mission Committee wants to update our volunteer list for PROPs and renew the awareness of the PROPS program.

The First Presbyterian Church recently updated their Mission Statement, which begins with "To Glorify God." One of the ways that we give glory to God is by the offerings we give him. Through PROPS we can give our time, our talents, and ourselves in building relationships. We recognize this as an opportunity to minister to our own church body.

This program is meant to match up helpers with those that need help. It is meant for temporary, light duty assistance. If you sign up as a volunteer, you might be asked to help someone who is ill or has had surgery or someone who needs help with a little project. This could mean grocery shopping, running errands, picking up medicine, shoveling sidewalks, doing small household chores or an occasional small household repair. If you are interested in being a PROPS volunteer, please sign up on the sheet in the narthex.

If you are in need of help, please call the church office at 672-1717 and someone will match you up with a helper. We encourage you to call if your situation is temporary, if your household chore is light, or if you need a minor household repair. If your situation requires long-term assistance or if your household repair is major, that would not be a project for PROPS. However, we can guide you in finding assistance if you would like.

Good day to all of you, God's Beloveds!

In 1933, at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, the first ever World Communion Sunday was celebrated. In a time of increasing worldwide fragmentation with the build up to World War II, this congregation recognized the power of communion to build Christian unity and the sacrament's focus on the connections we share as the body of Christ worldwide. Rev. Donald Kerr, a sixteen-year old at the time and the son of Shadyside's pastor, noted that "worldwide communion symbolized the effort to hold things together...It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ." This special Sunday began to catch on. By 1936, it was adopted as a denominational practice within the Presbyterian church. In 1940, a national ecumenical church council began promoting the Sunday as an event which should transcend denominational boundaries, and today World Communion Sunday is celebrated on the first Sunday of October around the globe as a true testament to that which unites more deeply than any other – Jesus Christ.

But unity in Christ as expressed at the Lord's table has always been difficult for some to grasp. In 1 Corinthians 11, Paul wrote to the community of believers in Corinth about sharing communion together. For these believers, communion was not like we know it today. They gathered around a table with much more than a cup and a loaf; it was a full-fledged meal. But Paul was concerned with what this meal had come to signify in the community. Rather than a table where all were welcome and could be fed, Paul found a table where those with much hoarded their food and left those with little to go hungry. Instead of uniting the community in their common bond of Christ, the meal was used to reinforce social distinctions between those with means and those without.

As we celebrate World Communion Sunday on October 6, let us be reminded of the day's origins and of Paul's intentions as he wrote to those in Corinth. Communion is an act of unity. It represents the shared connections all of humanity has in Christ that go beyond country, social, economic, and racial boundaries. This meal reminds us that, as God's beloveds, we are called to live beyond those boundaries, and the meal strengthens us to do just that by inviting each and every person not to the church's table or First Presbyterian's table but to the Lord's table where we gather around and in the name of Jesus Christ, who peacefully shared of all he had, even himself, in a world that was and is so often centered on greed and division.

In November, the ROCCS- Retreat, Outreach, Camping, Conference, and Service Committee will be hosting a high school retreat in Casper. The theme for this year's retreat is Faith in Media. It is the prayer of the committee to help broaden the attendees thinking to look beyond the label of the secular and Christian. We hope that they are challenged to look for Him in places where he "isn't suppose to be". That they are moved to think more about their faith and how it doesn't have to happen only in church, Sunday school, youth group, Logos or any other faith based program.

When I have free time" I like to watch Netflix and one day I stumbled across Lucifer. The story line is this; Lucifer escaped Hell and settles in Los Angels where he runs a night club. Through a course of events meets and teams up with a female detective to solve crimes. As I watched the series I found myself asking questions and thinking about how what I am see happening on the show lines up with what I believe. It makes me think deeper about what I believe. Sometimes things in the plot line make me see something from a whole new angle. It challenges me. It sends me out to talk with other to find the answers to my questions. This is what I want the kids to think about when we meet. How we can find ourselves reflecting on our faith, our beliefs, and seeking others to grow with.

I am sure by this point you are asking, what is your point, CJ? I really do have one. I am asking for help. If you ask my children, they say I know everything and Craig will say I am a know it all, but I want to know what secular media has touched you, made you stop, think, question, or even reaffirmed what you believe. If you can email (cjclem@actaccess) or leave me a note, I would appreciate it. It can be anything; book, movies, song, TV show, a news article, what ever. I would like to compile a list and use it for the retreat in November.

Another thing that I have come across in my adventures is the Fuller Youth Institute. They have wonderful resources for parents, grandparents, pastors, elders, whoever about how to engage with the youth in their faith and developing lifelong followers. They give you ideas about how to talk to your tween, teen or even your young adult about faith. They also help sponsor a study on characteristics of a successful church that have engaged youth. Out of the research came the book Growing Young. There is an opportunity this month, October 18-19 in Jackson Hole to listen to Brad Griffin, participate in round table discussions, and brainstorm with like mind people about how to grow young. During this free conference we will be looking at the 6 essential strategies that the research identified to help grow the young in the church. **This handcrafted hexagonal bamboo fly rod** is 7'6" (seven foot six inches) in length, a two piece rod with two tip sections

A 4 weight rod ideal for mountain streams and smaller waters made of Tonkin Bamboo (6 strip split cane)

The rod was built as a joint effort by Dennis Schreffler and Roger Barrett, both of Dayton. WY.

A traditional built rod with cork grip, snake guides, hook keeper and Nickel silver ferrules.

The taper is the Leonard 39 DH complete with the classic "swell"" configuration just in front of the cork grip,

A feature common to many Leonard tapers.

This taper formula was developed by Hiriam Leonard intended primarily for dry fly fishing.

The reel seat filler wood is maple, the hand made hardware is the classic cap and ring design with the end cap made with the Wyoming bucking horse logo


The nylon thread is brown and yellow in keeping with the Wyoming theme.

The hexagonal wooden case (rod tube) is handmade of Red Oak veneer with an Adams dry fly embedded in the cap of the rod tube.

A very serviceable rod, well suited to the mountain streams of the Bighorns.

**Tickets** for this Fly Rod donated by Roger Barrett and Dennis Schreffler are available for the price of \$5.00 for 1 and \$25.00 for 6. Watch for them on Sundays, also in the church office Mon.-Fri. 8-noon.


