

Dear Ones,

We are entering an exciting season in the church year and I'm not even talking about Advent! The first few weeks in November are among my favorite worship services of the whole year.

We begin by celebrating All Saints Sunday (Nov 6). This is a day when we fondly recall the ways in which those who have gone before us ran the race, passed on the faith, and nurtured us by their love and faithfulness. We chime a handbell as we read the names of those who have passed in the last year and the names of those submitted by all of you as the saints in your lives. If you would wish to add someone to that list for the liturgy, please let Juanita (juanita@sheridanfpc.church) or myself (karl@sheridanfpc.church) know by November 4. This year, I will be giving thanks for the witness of my aunt, Nancy, who lost a multi-year struggle with cancer in September. Until the point she could no longer physically do so, she served her little Presbyterian church in Montana by putting together the slides for worship each week. In my life, she, an accomplished scientist, showed me how faith and science went together quite well.

Advent always marks the turning to a new year on the church calendar, but on the Sunday before Advent, we wrap up the current year by celebrating Reign of Christ Sunday (Nov 20). This is a day when we see that all of what we have moved through in the different seasons of the church year as well as all of what we move through in our lives culminate in Jesus Christ and in Christ's kingdom. As we did last year, this will be a Sunday with LOTS of singing as we take the Sunday to move through the whole church year in just one service! Before we turn the page to Advent, we see how those stories all weave together. So long as the ship in time (a tall order these days), we will premiere and dedicate our new hymnals and pew Bibles that day.

In between those two Sundays, we will start a new tradition this year. In the first week, we consider the stories of our ancestors in the faith. In the third week, we consider the story of Jesus Christ, the Church, and our own story within that. In the week between (Nov 13), we will take a look at the story of the whole Bible and the threads that weave through the entire story as I share a sermon that I'll call, "The Bible in 15 Minutes." I will say, it might be 20, but we'll go from Genesis to Revelation in one service and you won't miss your brunch reservation.

The hymn that comes to mind to describe all of this is "Blessed Assurance" when we sing,

This is my story, this is my song, Praising my Savior, all the day long!

We have stories of the great cloud of witnesses that have passed this faith on, the written stories of God interacting with humankind from the Scriptures, and the story of Jesus Christ that ties it all together as "Christ is before all things and in Christ all things hold together" (Col 1:17). I hope you can join us in November as we celebrate these and see that they are really just one big story.

I remember "It takes a village to raise a child." being the catchphrase when I was growing up. I heard about it in school, on the news, and in books. I remember staying home sick from school and watching the "Today Show." One of the segments featured Hillary Clinton talking about her book and using that phrase. I believe her book was titled with the same expression. I was like, "What village? I live in a town there aren't any villages around." But, of course, I may have been a sarcastic teenager.

Reflecting on my life growing up, I remember several adults that were always around. My mom's friend would stay with us when she had to go out of town for work, or I would stay with a different friend, or my grandma would stay when my mom had to work late. My grandma took me to the doctor when I was sick because my mom couldn't get time off. I remember staying with the pastor and his wife one weekend while my mom had to go out of town for training. When I was older, I realized these people were the village that the phrase referenced. I also learned that it is an ancient African Proverb and not a brainchild of the 1990s. Each person contributed to my memory and showed me how to help someone in need and, sometimes, how to be a friend.

I don't remember talking or learning about All Saint's Day when I was younger. Instead, I remember learning about the Day of the Dead in Spanish class and seeing All Saints' Day on the calendar but never really understanding it. It wasn't until I was an adult that I remember talking and celebrating All Saints' Day. Reflecting on All Saints' Day, I offer my thanks to my paternal grandmother and maternal grandfather for taking me to church. My grandfather held my hand and dropped me off at Sunday school. My grandmother would sing and talk to me about the hymns. I had a couple of other saints in my life that influenced and nurtured my faith, but these two are the first to come to mind.

I had an opportunity recently to visit Izabel. I am proud of the adventure and the success she is having at college. Izabel shared that a friend we met while we lived in North Dakota took her out for supper. He told her that he wanted to take her back to Wahpeton so they could go to church there together. It warms my heart that she has that connection close when I cannot be there. Or that my close friend loves Izabel and that she drove two hours to go to Izabel's concert so that she would have a face in the crowd. These are saints that God brought into Izabel's life. Unfortunately, she may not know who they are at this stage of her life.

Izabel also told me one of the things that she misses from home is the church people. She misses the conversations and hugs on Sunday mornings, the hellos, and how are you when she sees everyone out and about. It is the interaction of people that Izabel knows who care about her, her saints. She said she didn't think about the connection at the time, but now that she doesn't have those, she misses them.

As I look around, I see the many saints that walk among us. They shape and mold us into who we are still striving to be. They lead by example. The little things they do every day are the most meaningful things people will remember. Listening to your stories of the wonderful saints, I did not have the honor of meeting. But, I heard love, dedication, and personal connection in these stories. The stories of those included in an event, the smile they shared when they met you at the door for Sunday school, or who had candy for the kids at church were the connection of the saints.

In today's fast pace, ever-changing, busy world, you need the village of saints to surround you. Help you realize that it is okay to be you just the way you are, to lend a hand when needed, or to show you the way when you are lost. Being a saint is about embracing the diverse relationships that God puts in your path.

The church and our faith are about relationships. Building relationships within our walls, outside the walls, the lost, the found, and everywhere in between. Be the saint when no one is looking because you never know who may see you.

Once I became a parent, I noticed more saints in my life. Because of the connections and relationships, I asked more seasoned parents questions like, what do I do (fill in the blank)? My child is doing this; what do I do? My child throws a fit about (fill in the blank); my child is dating; what do I do? My child left/will leave for college; how do I do this parenting thing now? If I didn't have relationships with fellow parents, I think Craig and I would have gone insane. So, to help save fellow parents' sanity, I invite all parents to come to Smith Alley on Sunday, November 13, at 5 pm to share a meal and hopefully a few laughs and stories and spark friendships. If you are in the stage of parenthood where childcare is needed, childcare will be provided at the church free of charge. Please RSVP to me (cj@sheridanfpc.church) for planning and reservation purposes by November 9. It will be a fun night of connecting with fellow First Presbyterian parents.




Good News at FPC

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The monthly Session meeting was held on Tuesday, October 18 at 7pm in the Fellowship Hall.

Noteworthy News--

- Communion is usually the first Sunday of the month, but in December there will be a cantata service lead by Ryan Landis on that day, and Pastor Karl will be on leave, so Session voted to move communion to the next Sunday, from Dec. 4 to Dec. 11.
- The Budget, Finance & Stewardship Committee asked Session to increase the Columbarium fee to \$1,000 per space. Currently the fee is \$425 for one person, \$850 for two people. The increase is for maintenance of the Columbarium and for the plaques, both new ones and replacing old ones that become weathered and worn. The new fee will go into effect on Jan. 1, 2023.
- The Personnel Committee announced three changes-- Mary Apple was hired for the 8 am worship service as organist and pianist; Ryan Landis has been named Music Director as he has assumed both the role of choir director and bell choir director; and Rod Fuller, who has been handling the duties of maintenance and grounds has also accepted the duty of custodian.
- The Worship Committee is proposing a different way of recruiting ushers for the 10:30 worship service by assigning each committee a month in which that committee will be responsible for finding ushers, either from their committee members or from the Congregation. Feel free to volunteer!
- There will be a Congregational meeting on November 13 for the purpose of electing elders.


