

Dear Ones,

We are one week into Lent at this point. I told a story to begin our worship service this past week that encapsulates, for me, one way of understanding this season. The story was this:

An anthropologist was studying a nomadic tribe during one of their migratory seasons. The tribe stopped after walking for a number of days to take an extended break. After a couple of days, the anthropologist thought they would be getting back into the migration so as not to lose days in the precious season. But the tribe continued to rest. The anthropologist just observed.

Eventually, the tribe began moving again. But a little while later, they stopped again for an extended break. The anthropologist found himself curious again but just observed. When the tribe finally reached its destination, the anthropologist just had to ask, "Why did you stop and waste those precious days of this season of good weather?" One of the elders in the tribe replied, "We had been pushing so hard, we had to stop and let our souls catch up to our bodies."

Lent is a time to let our souls catch up to our bodies. For early Christians, this was through practices of prayer, fasting, and the giving of alms (that is, increased generosity made possible by saving on what you gave up for the season). In our 21st century, we need time to rest our weary bodies. It is no stretch to say we are addicted to being busy and worn down. We look at a stack of papers in front of us or our lengthy to-do list, but even if we lament the stack or the list because of the anxiety they produce, there is still something within us that is accepting of this as normal. Perhaps this is because we mistake being busy for being useful. If we have created a lot for ourselves to do then we think we must be in high demand and thus an important piece of the bigger puzzle. This paradox is something from which we need to rest and something we need to evaluate.

So, rest in this season. Evaluate. Embrace your mortality (Ash Wednesday) for the sake of living more fully the aspirations of earnest and sincere discipleship. Let your soul catch up to your weary body and when it has then take the time to wonder to yourself about what made you so weary (it wasn't Jesus). Such time for contemplation is the gift of the Lenten season for we cannot proclaim and live a life of resurrection if we are worn down.

Should you desire a space for reflection or conversation, please let me know. I am always happy to meet with each of you and walk with you on this journey.

Remember, we received star words on New Year's Day during worship? How are you doing with your word? Mine is written on my whiteboard on the wall before my desk. I look up several times a day and see it. It is written in blue and has a swirling line underneath it, comprehension. Blah.

According to dictionary.com, comprehension means 1. the act of process of comprehending 2. the state of being comprehended 3. perception or understanding 4. capacity of the mind to perceive and understand; power to grasp ideas; ability to know 5. logic the connotation of a term. 6. inclusion. I wanted to ask Karl and Monic whose bright idea was it to add comprehension to the basket. I wanted to return it, but that wouldn't be fair, and the word jumped into my hand.

Comprehension and I are now three months in. I am still struggling with what comprehension means concerning my faith. Are we talking about Bible comprehension? I can recall the stories, the passages, and the words in the Bible, but what is true comprehension of the Bible? Can we, as humans in all our earthly glory, comprehend what Jesus' love means? I understand that God's love is unending. Jesus died on the cross for us. But do I really know what that is like? I love my children and would do anything for them, but I don't know if I would willingly send them into a situation knowing that the outcome would be their death. I don't even want to think about it. So, can I genuinely say my understanding of how unconditional His love truly is?

Comprehension is the power to grasp ideas. What are the ideas of the Bible? Love the Lord your God with all your mind, heart, and body. Go forward and be His hands and feet in the world. Go and make disciples of all nations. As a teacher, I was asked to show that my students could proficiently comprehend a lesson that was taught. The administration was the happiest when I could provide concrete evidence that students did grasp the skill, lesson, or idea that was taught. How do we do that with our faith? There isn't a comprehension test. I had a college professor refer to tests as suck and puke tests because you suck up all the information and then spit it out. There isn't a rubric to show the comprehension of the Bible. Ottis and I have been discussing the season of Lent and how Jesus fasted for forty days in the desert. His comprehension of the story led to his statement that Jesus couldn't live that long without food because you would starve in seven days, and forty days is greater than seven. He isn't wrong, and his questions guided us in an excellent discussion. His comprehension of what we read wasn't incorrect. We just needed to go deeper. I hope that through that discussion, his grasp of the meaning of Lent and the practice of giving something up or adding went deeper. At least maybe the seed was planted.

Reviewing the definition of comprehension, number six, inclusion, popped out at me. I never thought of comprehension as inclusion. Jesus was all about inclusion. He included everyone; the rich, poor, sick, healthy, young, and old. Jesus didn't discriminate against someone who may have disagreed with him. Instead, he sat with them, shared a meal, and talked. Including others in what you do is sharing your faith. Do not discriminate because that person isn't a certain age, you don't know how to talk to them, oh so and so wants to do that, or fill in the blank with a statement you have heard to justify why someone isn't included. Jesus included everyone, even the person he knew would betray him, with no exceptions. What would comprehension of that lesson look like?

I recently saw a meme of an image of Jesus sitting on rocks all alone. Across the picture is text saying, "Lent, because the extroverts can't have <u>all</u> the holidays." When I first read it, it made me chuckle. Of course, Jesus going into the desert for forty days is an introverted thing, but the more I thought about it, the more I don't know if I appreciate the more profound meaning.

Faith is a relationship between God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. It's personal, but then again, it isn't. If we comprehend the teaching that we must go out and serve others and be in communities with fellow believers, are we truly alone? We are taught when more than two are gathered, He is with us. Does that mean we need to surround ourselves with other believers for true comprehension? We also require alone time to talk with God, reflect, meditate, listen, and do whatever else we need to grow our faith. How do we find the balance? All these thoughts run through my head because of a word, comprehension, on a star that I pulled out of a basket. Who would have thought I would be wrestling with comprehension and I have ten months until I get a new word to mull over.



So in the past couple of months, when comprehension and I sat down to ponder why and how this word interacts with my faith, I may have in my mind said, "Curse you comprehension the star word!" in Dr. Doofenshmirtz's voice.


