Dear Ones,

Here comes Lent. Again. There is a rhythm of fasting and feasting within the church calendar. This mirrors the Christian life of sacrifice and joy. We live in humility and live selflessly so that all might be cared for and loved and we rejoice and feast on God's bountiful mercy and provision. Life is good. And life lived sacrificially helps it be good for others, too.

Traditionally, Lent is one of the seasons of fasting. In this lies the origin of the practice of giving something up for the season. This practice is more common in the Catholic tradition than the Protestant, but it is not foreign to us. I think we can see the benefit of altering our life at times so that we can lean more deeply into the story of Jesus Christ. Because Lent culminates in the giving up of Jesus's own life, the practice of giving something up ourselves represents our own desire and attempt to embrace and embody Jesus's story in ways that we can for the benefit of the world. Can we give of ourselves and benefit the world to the extent of Jesus? Of course not. Divine love is divine and is, therefore, beyond us. But we still emulate Jesus's love as we are able because whatever love we are able to sow by emptying ourselves is glorifying to God and good for God's world.

This Lent, I want to encourage you to participate in the season in two ways. First, give something up. There truly is something powerful about doing this. It is a tradition in the Christian faith for a real reason. It helps you embrace your reality that you rely upon God and allows you to seek God's guidance and provision as you fast from something. To give something up embodies your trust in the Lord. Even giving up things like sugar, caffeine, alcohol, or video games - these things that can seem silly or trivial - can be a deep practice of orienting yourself to God in all things and at all times.

Second, participate in the Wednesday evening Lenten soup and study. We are going to embrace the simplicity of Lent with a soup and bread meal and then we will read the book "Freeing Jesus" by Diana Butler Bass. This book discusses six different ways Jesus is made known in the New Testament: friend, teacher, savior, Lord, way, and presence. The sermons for each week of Lent will focus on these same titles so there will be an interweaving of the study and worship to help gain a fuller sense of the Lenten season, to have multiple points of entry to the discussion, and to rediscover Jesus anew. But this experience will be best undertaken together!

When the practice of giving something up began, it was done so that the money one saved by not purchasing what was given up could be offered as alms for the poor. Even though the practice of giving something up was individual, the result was to knit the community closer together and to share an experience. Our study will help us do the same. Confirmation has been going on for five months now. We have about three and a half months left. Getting to know the next generation of church members has been incredible. We have covered topics from the Nicene Creed, what a heretic is, church history, and different variations of the Lord's Prayer. Now, we are transitioning into traditions of our faith, exploration of their faith, and their statement of faith. It is always a refreshing time working with you. You get to see things through new eyes and different perspectives.

Working with the confirmands makes me more aware of the vocabulary we use as church members. For example, we discussed communion in one lesson, using the word eucharist. One brave participant asked what the eucharist is, which led to a great discussion. When we hear the same thing in different ways, it can help us rethink.

In a lesson, we read and discussed different variations of the Lord's Prayer. We then talked about how sometimes, when we do things repeatedly, we pay less attention when we hear them in a new way. It takes on a new meaning, or our understanding expands. The youth determined they liked the "old way" (the one we do in worship) better. For the youth, it is a comfort thing. It is something that they know and can be a part of.

The following variation of The Lord's Prayer from the New Zealand Prayer Book was one the class looked at. I enjoyed this one, and I am sharing it with you.

Eternal Spirit,
Earther-maker, Pain-bear, Life-giver,
Source of all that is and that shall be,
Father and mother of us all,
Loving God, in whom is heaven:

The hallowing of your name echo through the universe!

The way of your justice is followed by the peoples of the world!

Your heavenly will be done by all created beings!

Your commonwealth of peace and freedom sustain our hope and come on earth.

With the bread we need for today, feed us.

In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us.

In times of temptation and test, strengthen us.

From trials too great to endure, spare us.

From the grip of all that is evil, free is.

For you reign in the glory of the power that is love, now and for ever. Amen.




