


## ><>FROM PASTOR KARL<><

Dear Ones,

You might have caught this article in the Sheridan Press this week, but for those who missed it, I wanted to share the reflection here, too.

In the Jewish tradition, the first five books of the Old Testament are known as the Torah. The literal meaning of "torah" is instruction. The books are not just the narratives of creation, enslavement, exodus, settlement; their purpose is to teach.

Within these books, we find the Ten Commandments. This short, instructive list is a hot button issue as the state of Louisiana has passed legislation dictating its posting in public schools. While the new law is under appeals, many states are watching closely to see how this plays out hoping to follow suit.

As a pastor, I would like us to heed the good and ancient wisdom of the Ten Commandments. But posting these in the classroom will do nothing to help people live in a moral and upright way when most of us who profess a faith derived from the recipients of these commandments disregard them daily. I'll explain that remark by running through a summary of these commandments alongside my own commentary.

- 1. **Have no other gods before God.** We are wonderful at spending our time with the "little g" gods of consumerism, materialism, violence, the pursuit of pleasure. etc.
- 2. **Don't make idols.** Very few of us resist bowing down to the almighty dollar nevermind our idolization of our own interpretations and experiences.
- 3. **Don't take the Lord's name in vain.** This isn't about the random cuss word. This is about using God's name for your personal gain. It is rampant in our discourse.
- 4. **Remember the Sabbath day.** We glorify production and demonize rest as laziness. Many are burnt out or breaking and few notice or offer reprieve.
- 5. **Honor your parents.** We have watched intergenerational relationships break down and rarely allow people who wish to care for parents the time to do so.
- 6. **Don't murder.** We excuse violence with a myriad of trite defenses.
- 7. **Don't commit adultery.** Fidelity runs thin. We are also bad at talking about or showing the gamut of what successful and lasting relationships look like.
- 8. **Don't steal.** Rather than doing what is right, we do what we can get away with.
- 9. **Don't lie.** There is always someone else to blame.
- 10. **Don't covet.** Back to the "little g" god of materialism. We put value on people and ourselves based on how much we possess.

The commandments are an important part of the instruction of the Christian faith and give good wisdom for life together. They are a teaching tool, but ultimately, posting them in the public classroom will just cause division not right living, resentment not reconciliation. This is a political stunt, not a faithful one, and the act, oddly enough, breaks the second and third commandments.

Rather, the best way to instruct on the 10 Commandments? Live them. Then, give yourself a little grace and try to live them again when you fail to do so. As hard as that might be. Much harder than legislating them. Much more what God desires.

The high school mission trip team had a fantastic week in Benton Harbor, Michigan. There was laughter, tears (mainly from laughing so hard), memories made, and faith experienced. The people we served were amazing! It is amazing to see how they help the community and how thankful the community is.

Each evening after dinner, we had the opportunity to have community partners share about their mission. One evening, we heard the story of Sharon and Emmanuel Brown and the mission of the African American History & Literature Gallery. The gallery's purpose is to preserve the heritage of the cultures and educate others.

Sharon said we must look out a different window during her presentation. This phrase stuck with me. The more I thought about "looking out a different window," the more the phrase stuck with me. I know it is a different take on the phrase, but I look at it differently. A window has more of a personal feel to it.

We have our houses. A house is a home where we feel comfortable and safe. It is a place where we can be ourselves. In Sheridan, you have a spectacular view. Our windows are what we look out to see what is going on outside. I used to tell Ottis to look outside and see what the weather looked like, and this helped him pick out his outfit for the day. We look out our windows and see the world around us.

I can't remember who said it, but they said the eyes are the window to our souls. Looking into our windows, you can see what is on the inside. But there are also ways to look out. Our eyes shape what we see in our lives, work, play, and faith. Our experiences in life interoperate with what we see.

Sharon's message was that we need to open our windows and be willing to see what the view is from someone else's window. Not all windows look out into the same world, even if they are next-door neighbors. You need to visit your neighbor and view the scene from their window. Absorb what you see and help it shape your view. It might not completely change it; it might just expand it a little more so you can see more of the bigger picture.

Benton Harbor, Michigan, is next to St. Joseph, Michigan. The locals call them sister cities. The St. Joseph River separates the two towns. You have a different feeling when you cross over from Benton Harbor to St. Joseph. The cars are newer. The houses have a little more curb appeal. I didn't see too many people out and about in their yards. Granted, we didn't spend too much time in St. Joseph, but the feel was just different than we did. It felt that their window views were completely different.

Sharon shared that she was working on a Martin Luther King Jr. statue for the downtown park. It is something that she was passionate about. She shared that another committee in St. Joseph reached out to her to express a desire to have something similar in St. Joseph. Sharon described the statues. The bronze statues will be the same - Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. with children playing-the only difference is how they will face each city. The statues will be facing each other in their towns.

The mission behind the Unified Civic Monument Project, the committee formed to bring this project to life, is to create a visual representation of unification. The hope is that it will spark the desire to learn more about the other, to look through someone else's window.

When people hear the phrase mission trip, they often envision this grant trip building/rebuilding a destroyed structure. Sweeping in and making this grand gesture, don't get me wrong, these trips are wondering and have their place, but the "small" ones, going and helping build community gardens, organizing a thrift shop, doing yard work for a local mission, or whatever is just as impactful. Both of these mission trips help the participants look through a different window.

Thanks Karen, Eli, Mickey, Tyler, and Ryker for going on this adventure with me. We had an adventure!

Our Bible Study was by Ann Voskamp. It was called "One Thousand Gifts" A Dare to Live Fully Right Where You Are. Ann shared how counting the small things/gifts and writing them down made her change her attitude to an attitude of gratitude for good and bad. A study shows that people who journal thankfulness are 25% happier than those who don't. Ann kept a journal by her kitchen sink, in her purse and on the bedside stand. In these she wrote down things she was thankful for. She changed. She started to live eucharisteo which is living a life of grace, thanksgiving and joy.

At the end of the study she asked us to pray in any of the suggested areas:

Ask God to help you pour out His goodness and gifts as you receive them.

Pray that you will have courage to remove your masks and let God and others see who you really are.

Ask for God to make your church a place where people can be honest and transparent about their struggles and frailties and know they will still be loved.

Invite God to use your hands to wash the feet of the people He places in your life.

Pray that you will be like the Sea of Galilee and not the Dead Sea. May God's gifts and grace flow into and through you.

Thank God for His gifts – and ask Him to show you how you can become the gift.

Ann also wrote, "God calls us to do thanks. To give thanks away. That thanks-giving might literally become thanks-living."

Another statement says, "Thy will be done. This is the way the self dies, falls into the arms of Love. This is why the fight for joy is always so hard."

"Thanksgiving is the one thing God asks to be done in everything and always...He knows what precedes the miracle."

"When we can't see His hand, we can always see His heart."

"All gratitude is ultimately gratitude for Christ, all remembering a remembrance of Him."

"Joy doesn't negate all other emotions – joy transcends all other emotions."



# **FPC in Action!**




