

Dear Ones,

I love the Prayer for Peace by St Francis of Assisi. I love to read it, to speak it, and I love when we sing it:

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

This prayer pushes against our inclinations. Where we might enjoy the consolation of another and pine for it, this prayer reminds us that Jesus calls us to be those who console as he consoles. The prayer calls us not to find our worth in receiving love but in giving love, and it urges us to be makers of peace (especially good words when our society's vitriol is at the regular four-year peak of a presidential election). We all need these words.

But how do you hear them? How do you let them take root and move toward becoming an instrument of all of these Christ-like characteristics - pardon, faith, hope, light, joy?

I had the pleasure of visiting the Cathedral Basilica of St Francis in Italy while on a choir tour in college. The sanctuary had ceilings as tall as the building and the cavernous space echoed fervently. Whenever someone raised their voice and the echo made it to the middle of the space, the guard stationed there said directly into a microphone so that all could be reminded, "Shhhh....Silence....Silencio!"

Our choir joked about this the remainder of the trip and when we returned to Laramie. Our director even quieted us down a time or two to begin our daily rehearsal by stating, "Shhhh....Silence....Silencio!"

If we wish to live into the prayer of Saint Francis, we would be wise to heed the hush and the words of the guard who monitors the sacred space that bears the saint's name and remains. We can only make peace if we have quieted ourselves so the troubles of others reach our ears. We can only sow hope if we are aware of where there is despair. We can only exude joy if we are in the midst of those who are saddened and have deeply embraced and understand their troubles. This takes listening. Listening takes silence. Many times the most faithful witness is the quietest one.

When I was younger, I would go spend time with my grandparents on their farm. I would follow my grandpa around while he worked with his cattle and sheep and worked on his farm equipment. I remember one time after he changed the oil in his truck, he left the old oil filter sitting out. While he was changing the oil, my little brain went a mile a minute, coming up with questions and asking him. He chuckled and said, "Oh oh, my girl you are filled with the questions, go figure it out." I then proceeded to take the oil filter apart to look at it and investigate why it worked. My grandpa thought it was funny, but my grandmother did not. Guess who had to clean up oil-covered little CJ. My questions did not just pertain to automotive functions on the farm but to the world. I remember watching a calf being born, watching closely as the veterinarian came to take care of the animals, why did the corn grow, how do fireworks work, and asking questions along the way. I loved learning about things.

As I got older, my questions became more internal and complex. Some of the questions got me into trouble, but I wanted to know what was happening and why. I remember a teacher telling me, "You don't need to know why; just do it the way I should you." I think this is one of the reasons why I enjoyed science classes where you could get the answers. I was supposed to ask questions and investigate.

After years of asking questions to myself and reflecting on why I like asking questions, I like questions because I want to learn more about what is going on around me. The questions also helped me learn more about the people around me. In my brain, if I know why or how someone thinks, then I can better understand them and communicate with them. I can word my responses better. I can put myself in their situation or have a better understanding of where they are coming from, and I can be more compassionate. I feel without questions and investigation how will we learn and discover new things about the world around us and ourselves?

Asking questions helps us dig deep and find answers we may not even know we know. Jesus asked questions of his disciples and the crowds around him. I know he knew the answers to the questions he asked. He asked the questions to get the people to look at themselves and find the answers within themselves. One of the questions Jesus asked (Matthew 6:26) "And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?" This gets me every time. No, it can't, but why am I worrying? Getting to the heart of the why is a start. Asking a question like, can you tell me more why you think that way -Is another good question to investigate.

I came across this quote from Rachel Held Evans: "Most adults I know aren't looking for a religion that answers all of their questions, but rather a community for faith in which they feel safe to ask them." It struck me—how true that it is. Not just adults but children. How do we foster an environment to ask these questions? Children ask between 100-300 questions a day. Why as adults do we stop asking questions? I know as an adult, I don't have all the answers. and still ask questions. I know many of my questions are inside my head questions. I will save them for later and either Google or ask a trusted person, which with my brain will cause more questions. I then will ponder my questions and answers and more than likely come up with more questions. But through my investigation, I get a better understanding and I get to own my answers. It isn't wonderful that despite us having questions, we are still loved unconditionally by God?

The 2024-2025 backpack tags state, "Be Curious. Ask Questions." These are great reminders for kids and adults. If you didn't get a tag and would like one, let me know, and I can hook you up!

Go out and be like a toddler, ask questions, and be curious.


