Dear Ones,

We sing with our young disciples every week, "Jesus loves me this I know for the Bible tells me so!" At home, I only need to start the melody and the first couple of lyrics and Harper Jo can sing the rest of the tune. I am so glad that this reality is beginning to sink into her being at a young age for it is the only eternal truth. Paul reminds us of this in Romans when he states, "I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39). The love of God is what wraps us up in the divine and is the best truth to hold at the center of our being.

For as easy as it is to sing those words, however, it seems that it gets more difficult to believe them as we get older. We have difficulty comprehending a love that is unconditional. Human love operates differently and as we age we become accustomed to that mode of operation. Our love for others is often determined by attractiveness and character. We find it much easier to love someone - to give of ourselves, our time, our energy, and our very being - if that person is nice, kind, important to us for whatever reason, or if they meet some other standard we have set up in our mind. We live pretty naturally in a quid pro quo state; we give our love in exchange for something whether we acknowledge it or not.

God does not operate this way. Divine love does not make distinctions between people and it has no personal preference. We would be wise to add some of our own qualifiers for love to Paul's list in Romans: neither beauty, nor wealth, nor goodness, nor achievement can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ. While we are quid pro quo, God is never transactional. We can never earn God's love. We will never be good enough for God's love, but God does not love us because we are good. Rather, we are good and even "very good" as Genesis says because God loves us.

Think of a time you have known God's love and received it. Could you not help but feel in that moment as if you might just be God's favorite? I hope so, because you are! All of us are God's favorite! We do not always seem to have the capacity to imagine the notion of such amazing love, but it is true! "Jesus loves me this I know for the Bible tells me so!" And this will always be true!

Remember today how far reaching God's love is and trust that it is for you. You do not have to perform for this love. You do not have give anything for it. Rather, we know it best when we surrender our lives to it and let ourselves be immersed in it. Then, when we find ourselves wrapped up, it becomes that much easier to love as God loves and to see that all others are loved and worth loving. In a time when we seem to be increasingly looking for reasons to hate or discount or make others prove themselves, let's take a page out of God's book and let the love of Christ for us and all others be that which keeps us together since nothing can separate us from it.

In middle school and high school, I was active in my church's youth group. We would meet on Sunday nights. We would have a state-wide youth gathering once a year. I admit that I was always excited to attend the state events but disappointed because they were mostly held in my town. Except for once, It was held in Sioux Falls, SD, and we got to travel. We loaded up the church van and headed out. Our conversations in the van were full of laughter and getting to know one another better. I remember one girl saying she thought the moon landing was a hoax, and my mind was blown!

I remember vague topics that we talked about in breakout sessions, but what really stuck was the feelings of being loved and accepted and the church camp high, or as it was explained to me later in my life, a mountaintop experience. I went to a high school where it wasn't really "cool" to wear churchy stuff or talk about your beliefs. Being surrounded by other middle and high school students who felt and believed like me was like a shot in the arm that, yes, I love Jesus and am proud of it. It was also wonderful to know that I was surrounded by other kids with the same beliefs and I wasn't alone.

This feeling of belonging was something that the whole gathering felt. Several of us would break the rules and move sleeping bags around to form a sleeping circle with new friends so we could stay up, whispering and getting to know one another. At the end of the weekend, my new friends and I would all hug, cry, and look forward to the next event. Sometimes, we would exchange phone numbers.

Fast-forward to Fall 2017. I am working at the church, and Pastor Doug tells me that there is a youth gathering happening in July at Purdue University called Triennium. I was like, what is this? I was told it would be an experience that I wouldn't forget, even going as a chaperone. I was thinking okay and had my experiences in mind. Boy, was I wrong! Those feelings I had going to my state events were nothing compared to Triennium. I should have known better because a nationwide event was nothing compared to a little state one. The youth who attended seemed to have fun and bonded with each other. It was four days filled with worship, breakout small groups, games, and free time to explore the different stations they had set up around campus. The feelings of belonging to something bigger and surrounded by Jesus' love were overwhelming. The youth that I took on that trip came back with a different perspective of what it means to be a disciple of Christ, and I would like to think that they are not alone in being a Presbyterian youth. The theme that year was "Let us GO and see."

I had the privilege of going again in 2019. The feelings and experiences were just as powerful the second time around. We had the same opportunities with slight changes. The theme was "Here is My Heart." We had so many exceptional worship services and fantastic messages. We heard from the current co-moderator of the General Assembly, Rev. CeCe Armstrong. She said you can change the world, but it is okay to let the world change you a little. Take your experiences and reflect, ponder, let the experience shape you, and let it be written on your heart. Rev. Armstrong also said to stop looking to the sky to see Jesus. Look around you and see him where you are.

Triennium was canceled in 2022, but it is on track for July 2025. The theme for this Triennium is "As If We Were Dreaming," based on Psalm 126. I am excited to see where this theme and leadership will take it. There are also several other changes for Triennium 2025. One of the main changes is the location. It will be held in Louisville, KY, at the Kentucky International Convention Center (KICC), the town of the headquarters for Presbyterian USA. We will also be staying in hotels. When we would stay at Purdue, there was always the fear of not getting the dorm with air conditioning, so that is not a worry this time.

The other exciting change is that they are adding a Young Adult track. This opportunity is for young adults ages 18-23. This group of young adults would have been the youth eligible for Triennium in 2022. They will have their own small groups, but still be part of the Wyoming delegation.

Part of the requirements for the high school and eighth grader participants is to participate in fundraising for Triennium 2025. Even though the event is roughly 299 days away, the crew from Sheridan will be starting their fundraising efforts this month. We will sell raffle tickets for your chance to win a ½ of a processed pig donated by Double L Meat Processing. Tickets will be \$10 each and available on Sunday mornings or from any participant. The drawing will occur on Wednesday, October 30, between dinner and study time at The Bridge.

If you know of someone who would be eligible to attend and did not make the informational meeting last month, please contact me. I would love to share the information about Triennium. I strongly feel that this experience is a faith-forming event that will have a lasting impact on their lives.

This opportunity would not be possible without your support for many of our church's youth, so thank you!



Dear Church Family,

On May first, at the emergency room, Greg and I learned he had a fast growing, inoperable brain tumor. Greg died July seventh.

Alone in the ER room, I waited for Greg to return from the MRI. But the first CAT scan had told me all I needed to know. I can be cynical, even when I pray, and I cheekily complained to God why don't Presbyterians have saints to help them at a time like this. I need a saint.

As I looked up, I saw the busy ER staff tending to others. I was reminded of "our" saint, Fred Rogers, a Presbyterian. Mr. Rogers said, "When bad things happen look for the helpers."

The story that unfolded from that point on was about helpers. So many wonderful, kind, quiet helpers. I will never be able to thank you all for all the different ways you helped. But I am grateful.

Apparently, monks do not pray for themselves, except for mercy. Any prayer for themselves is how to best love others. They are humble enough to know they too need prayer, so, when they give alms, they ask the recipient to pray for and bless them.

You asked for nothing, but I wish to bless you with the words from Paul to the Ephesians 3:14 -21.

This, then is what I pray, kneeling before the Father, from whom every family, whether spiritual or natural, takes its name:

Out of His infinite glory, may he give you the power through His Spirit for your hidden self to grow strong, so that Christ may live in your hearts through faith, and then planted in love and built on love, you will with all the saints have strength to grasp the breadth and the length, the height and the depth; until, knowing the love of Christ, which is beyond all knowledge, you are filled with the utter fullness of God.

Glory be to him whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine; glory be to him from generation to generation in the Church and in Christ Jesus for ever and ever. Amen
