Dear Ones,

On Tuesday, we will head to the polls and exercise our civic duties as American citizens (unless you voted early). This election year, things seem to be tense. They were tense in 2020 and a little bit in 2016, but I don't remember them being like this before my adult life. I think we're all acting a little crazy at times because the election gives us a pass to do so. In a campaign season when making enemies seems to be fashionable so that one can separate oneself from the other candidate, we easily forget that Jesus asks us to pray for enemies not to make them. We are called to behave differently as Christians than what our political system asks of us.

That clash between politics and faith is nothing new. Even Jesus was tempted with power and saw that his way went a different direction. But there has been a marked shift that I have noticed in the last 8 years in how our political parties operate in our lives and the functions they serve. Our behavior and priorities have seemed to change. David Brooks recently put it this way, "In an increasingly secular age, political parties are better seen as religious organizations that exist to provide believers with meaning, membership and moral sanctification." Though Brooks notes the secular age, this is as much or more of an issue for religious persons. We profess Jesus to be our guiding way and truth, but many of us are increasingly gaining meaning and direction from the political pursuits of our parties. We are quick to trust the talking heads of our preferred news networks but not the learned people of our faith traditions. If our parties only serve to gain power, push cultural issues more than policy (as is the norm now), and make enemies of the opposite side as a means to this end, where is that going to leave us? Who will that turn us into? It's not going to make us any more like Jesus no matter what your party is.

So what next? I encourage you to exercise your civic duty. We don't have to hold our efforts to follow Jesus and our responsibilities as Americans completely apart from one another. They are not mutually exclusive. However, just as Jesus reminds his disciples that his kingdom is not an earthly one, let us remember this week that our citizenship in his kingdom is the citizenship that is meant to help us make meaning, find our identity, and guide our transformation to be more like him.

Then, after you've voted, go right out the doors of the polling place and love your neighbor (i.e. show them an act of kindness and love). Pray for those who vote differently than you. Quit making enemies out of other people. Look at the world like Jesus did, as a place that is full of people who need love not a place full of people to make into the opposition. Serve at Lunch Together or somewhere else. Cultivate gratitude for what you have. Be generous. Turn off the television and read a psalm. Turn it over and read it again. Find meaning in faith not in the pursuit of power, not in the fallible persons you voted for, and not in the results either. If your candidates lose, Jesus loves you. If your neighbor's candidates win, Jesus wants you to love them. If your neighbor's candidate loses, Jesus wants you to love them. That is how we make meaning and how we are called to be as those who follow Jesus.

As a final note, I want to put one more practical piece out there for you. Social media is one platform that has heightened everything I've noted and spurred that change I've seen over eight years. Our calling to be disciples doesn't go out the window when our fingers hit the keyboard. If a post riles you up, that's the point of it. Stop the cycle and don't share it.

You never know the journey that God designed for you, but when you look back, you think, mm... good one, God! As I sit down to write my 120th newsletter article, I have been very reflective.

Ten years ago, I saw an advertisement in the newspaper. It was just a little square asking for a temporary position to help run the youth programs until vacation Bible school the following summer. My family and I had just started attending church here, so I figured, why not apply. On a fateful Monday night, I walked into the office door and was led to the parlor filled with people all staring at me as I walked in. I am sure it wasn't that full, but every couch and chair seemed to have someone sitting on it. They asked me to sit in the lone chair across from everyone, and it felt like I had a spotlight shining down on me. One of the questions I remembered was what a mature Christian looks like. I answered the question, and Pastor Doug added to it. Who would have thought that a temporary job until June would have lasted this long?

When I started, my life was so different. Ottis was just a tiny two and half month old. Eli was in second, Izabel was in fifth, and Brenden had started his last year in middle school. We were running in so many different directions with kids' activities. Now, Ottis is in fifth grade, Eli is preparing to graduate high school, Izzi is a junior in college, and Brenden is married and living his best life. It seems like I blinked, and here we are. The constant would be Craig. He hasn't changed.

During Bible study, we talked about how we are created to work together to carry each other's burdens. When I was younger when I heard the word burden I also thought of burdens as negative. You don't want to have burdens because they drag you down. As I gained more life experiences, I learned that burdens are significant and could be time-consuming but not necessarily bad. Over the time that I have been here, I have gone to Triennium twice, a substitute Triennium. I have attended 15 state youth retreats, several lock-ins, 9 vacation Bible schools, 10 Christmas programs, countless Sunday school and midweek classes, and all the other little things along the way. I have not done these things by myself. You have come together, worked alongside each other, and lifted all these activities up and the work that has gone into them. They are works of love, and without you, most of the things we offer would not be able to happen, so thank you! It has been and will continue to be a beautiful partnership.

I am reminded of the song "Seasons of Change" from the musical Rent.

"525,600 minutes, 525,000 moments so dear.
525,600 minutes - how do you measure, measure a year?
In daylights, in sunsets, in midnights, in cups of coffee.
In inches, in miles, in laughter, in strife.
In 525,600 minutes - how do you measure a year in the life?
How about love? How about love? Measure in love.
Seasons of love."

All 5,256,000 minutes here has been measured in love. I cherish all the memories and can't wait see what God has in store for us.

Good News at FPC!


