Dear Ones,

We are nearing Lent, and I will probably write about that next month as Ash Wednesday is March 5 and we will have a service that evening at 6:30 PM after a soup and bread dinner at 5:30 PM. But I want to encourage you a month in advance to think about the spiritual disciplines of Lent. Traditionally, Lent was a time to fast, pray, and practice generosity. In fasting, ancient Christians gave something up and the premise of doing so freed up funds that were then given to the poor. Some of our Catholic siblings still give up meat during Lent. The root of doing so is because meat was expensive so by giving it up much could be given to the poor. This was a tangible way that the Christian faith was lived out in the season.

Lent helps to shape the entirety of our lives, not just one season, to be lives of spiritual practice. So often, we can be hung up with this faith as one that is a way of thinking. But faith is more than that. It is not a step on a linear progression of life that is slightly better than the step before it. Christian living is completely different. It withdraws from some things, embraces others, practices generosity, and wraps all of that in the sort of prayer that is more concerned with pouring out our heart before God and opening it so widely with all of our petitions that all we can do afterward is listen and be filled with the transforming words that God gives. The Christian life seeks grace and grounds its hope in mercy rather than wealth, security, well-being, or anything else. It does not tolerate the complacency of life but strives for all to be wrapped in God's peace. A disciple of Jesus Christ is always seeking to be closer to his character.

This all sounds like a lot, but when we read the Gospels, I am surprised how often Jesus lives in a completely different way while engaging in day to day activities. He embodies the love of God not just because he is God, but by feeding people with fish and bread, touching their wounds, holding their aching hands, placing a child on his knee, and picking fruit from a tree. He prays in the garden. He sleeps on a boat. These are activities we can imagine engaging in. They are simple and do not require a lot more than a little chopping and cooking, bending and reaching, holding and comforting. But they are the acts that change lives. An embodied and practiced faith may not change the world all at once, but it will change lives slowly as dripping can change stone.

How might you embody this faith and let grace drip down? How might you change the world?

I am in a love-hate relationship with the practice of star words. Last year, I had devotion. I thought that was perfect! Devotion is so easy. I mean devotion; they have books devoted just to devotion and showing devotion to God. I'll pull out one of several devotions and call it good. My year of devotion was more intense than just reading one of my devotions. I did get a couple of new ones in the past year. I had to; my star word told me I had to. As the year progressed, there were several situations where devotion became more of a portrayal than just reading words on a page.

What does it mean to be devoted? In "Grease," Sandy sang about being hopelessly devoted. Did my start mean I would become dedicated, and would I have to give up my hope to show that I am devoted? I am, but that just isn't who I am. I am always full of hope, to the point where I am an annoying ray of sunshine. I put my hope in Jesus' love. Through his love and devotion to me, I can walk in the confidence that I am loved, and no matter what, nothing will change that.

Then, my thoughts came to the notion that devotion is watching and waiting, hoping and praying that your actions will bring about growth. Through this devotion, it will inspire others. One of my college professors would share Einstein's definition of stupidity, doing the same thing repeatedly and expecting different results. What is the difference between stupidity and devotion? To be devoted is to stay around long enough to see the change happening and pray for the change.

My first star word in 2023 was comprehension. That word was a hard one. I had to dig deep to embrace it fully. I was glad we had a whole year to wrestle with it. I still don't fully comprehend things, but I am glad I am in community with you fabulous people to help when I don't understand.

This year's word is complete. If the last two years of star words have taught me anything, I have no idea where this word will lead me or the wrestling that may come from it. I will admit that when I first really thought about my word, the scene from the 1996 movie Jerry McGuire, where Jerry is telling the woman he loves, "you complete me," did play out in my mind. I have a whole eleven more months to figure it out.

I want to thank you for your devotion to the church's children and youth. Your support is fantastic! We had thirteen amazing chilis entered this year. Congratulations to Christian Education on your big win! The money raised at the chili cook-off will help fund the youth heading to Triennium in July. The money raised from the silent auction will be split between funding First Presbyterian Church's camp scholarships and Triennium. Again, thank you for all you do to support the faith formation of FPC!






We had our annual fellowship roller skating party at Scotty's Skate Castle. Nobody broke a bone...although it was touch & go for a moment.


