Dear Ones,

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent. At the Ash Wednesday service, we mark ourselves with the sign of the cross using ashes made from the branches waved the previous Palm Sunday. The use of the palm branches is a reminder of the cyclical nature of the Christian life. This faith is known within the circle of life and death. We transition regularly from the joyful celebrations akin to Palm Sunday to the penitence and embrace of mortality that mark Ash Wednesday.

Ash Wednesday might be the closest thing we have to an altar call within our tradition. An altar call is a moment in a worship service when people are invited to come forward to the front of the sanctuary and make a public profession to follow Jesus. It is a regular occurrence in more evangelical Christian traditions. In the Presbyterian tradition, we make a public confession of faith when baptized (or have one made on our behalf). We state what we believe when we join a congregation, and we reaffirm these confessions regularly in the words of our Affirmation of Faith and in joining together in renewing baptismal vows.

But on Ash Wednesday, we are invited to come forward in our desire to follow Jesus and to be marked in a public way with the sign of our Lord. This is a chance to recognize that our lives are a living sacrifice to Jesus. But at the heart of our theological tradition and central to this invitation forward at the start of Lent is the truth that we come forward not because we can offer our hearts to Jesus but because he has offered his to us. Again, we come to the altar (chancel in our theological language) because God has opened the divine heart in Jesus Christ and wishes for us to enter.

This year, we will be marked with the ashes, embracing our mortality, and then we will share communion and remember that Jesus Christ also embraces our mortality in the sacrificial act through which we have come to know the gift of God's own heart. We will break the bread and pass the cup so that we might know, once again, that even the dust we return to is held in the heart of God through the life, death, and resurrection of our Savior.

I hope you will join on Wednesday for this powerful service and movement into the Lenten season. Worship will be at 6:30 PM. There is a simple soup and bread meal beforehand at 5:30 PM for those who would wish to come. These meals will continue on Wednesday nights throughout the Lenten season as a point of gathering and reflection during the penitential season.

As I sit down to write my article, I am flooded with all the things that I could write about. This is a first for me because I am not one to look forward to writing my newsletter article. Don't believe me, ask Juanita or Karl. I think not writing a newsletter article was one of the highlights I said to Karl when I accepted the Executive Director position at Camp Story. He told me that I would still have to write one every month. I am not sure if he was serious or not. I would want it noted; it is probably my longest.

I have so many fond memories over the last ten years. Many of those memories are tied to Camp Story and the church. The first time I was at Camp Story was in February 2015, and the Coalition had just formed to explore the option of running Camp Stroy for the Presbytery. Tracey Burke and I drove up to camp. We got out. I put little Ottis in his backpack carrier and we started walking around the camp. The peace and calm that settled over me in that moment made me want to be part of helping to preserve that feeling for campers. Later that year in May, I remember sitting at Brenden's junior high track meet and Elwyn Maloy asking me if I had heard about the Presbytery's decision about camp and I had not. He was the one that shared that information with me. Again, another cherished memory tied to the camp and the wonderful people of FPC. The first clean up day we had was a damp day. It drizzled on and off, but wasn't as cold as it could have been. We worked hard, but there was also laughter in the air as people of all ages came together to celebrate this gift.

The next year, I went to Triennium. The overall theme for the time was "GO!" With the logo was a shoe with wings. The t-shirt we got was a heather charcoal black/grey with the theme, scripture, and the shoe in black. The consensus was it was hard to read, and you had to focus to see all the information. I may still have the t-shirt shoved in my grubby clothes drawer. Every time I pull it out, I have to look to see the "GO!"

During the week at Triennium, we were challenged to Go—to see what God is doing, to go and do likewise—to be kind and serve, open to hearing and learning the way I should go, let my people go—defend those who need defending, and great go—and make disciples. For the past couple of months, God has sent me little signs that have activated memories.

Over the past ten years, the "GO" has popped up in the children, youth, and family events around the church. I have taught five confirmation classes, countless Sunday school and LOGOS/The Bridge classes, vacation Bible schools, lock-ins, three out-of-state mission trips, several smaller in-state, led two Triennium adventures, one substitute Triennium, and coordinated and planned several statewide retreats. Through these experiences, many memories were made; most were good ones, relationships were formed and built upon, and love was in and overflowed through it all. In the background of all these activities was the love and support of the church. You help make all this possible, from volunteering to teaching, chaperoning, donations, prayers, letters, and conversations. And you continue to help and support. Evidence of that is sitting out in the hallway as I write this, the silent auction, and the lingering smell of the chili from the chili cook-off.

On the last day of the Triennium, the theme was the Great Commission, which calls us to make disciples of all nations and embrace the challenge of being God's people. The pastor talked about how it might not be comfortable, and there may be tears, but we should go, do, and answer the call. Well here I am taking what feels like a huge step. It is scary, but so thrilling too.

I have to admit, the first time I was approached about the potential of being the executive director for camp, it was a very strong no, nope, I don't think so. As time passed, with prayer, reflection, and encouragement I considered the possibility. I figured, why not. The Holy Spirit has been leading me to this point. I need to embrace it, and like my first Triennium said "GO!" take that leap of faith and said sure, let's go!

As I take off on my GO, I am filled with excitement that is Camp Story and all the wonderful things that entails, but also filled with sadness. I have been truly blessed to be a part of a church full of love and encouragement and that embraces change with an open heart and mind. Just not me, but my family. The relationships that they have formed and the love that surrounds them is astonishing! It is what makes church a home. When a good thing ends, it is a little sad in a sentimental way. I am not going far and will continue to have your love and support in a different capacity. In the transitional period, there will be some bumps in the road and growing and learning for everyone, but we will continue to face it with the love and grace we are known for. Thank you for everything!








Rachel Mathews-Landis' Pre K Sunday School class had a visitor one Sunday. Everyone enjoys Sunday school.




Good News at FPC!


Prakash shared his musical talents during Sunday morning worship.
